Rudyard Kipling wrote many poems, songs and books with a goodly number situated in Victorian India of the late 1800s. Our writing is a section of the poem written in the vernacular of a British soldier who has been wounded in a battle possibly in the North-West Frontier. Gunga Din was an Indian water-carrier who was attached to the army unit to assist soldiers during a battle by supplying them with water and rendering primitive first aid. Typically, the Indians were treated with varying degrees of contempt by the soldiers, but in this case Gunga Din saves the life of the poem's narrator who ultimately admits that Gunga Din is a better man than he is. The poem was published in a collection of military poems called *Barrack-Room Ballads*.

Entry tag to be attached to outside of bag with sticky tape. **No staples** to be used on baking items. No commercial mixes allowed. **All pastry and filling must be homemade.**

#### YEAST PRODUCTS

All yeast breads, buns and rolls are to be baked the day before judging.

1. Bread – white - pan size minimum 8" x 4" x 2 ½" maximum 9" x 5" x 3"
2. Bread - 60% Whole Wheat - pan size minimum 8" x 4" x 2 ½" maximum 9" x 5" x 3"
3. Sticky Buns – 3
4. Raisin Bread - pan size minimum 8" x 4" x 2 ½" maximum 9" x 5" x 3"
5. Dinner Rolls – white or whole wheat - 3
6. Bread – white – made in a bread machine
7. Any type loaf made in a bread machine
8. Loaf of Gluten Free Bread - pan size minimum 8" x 4" x 2 ½" maximum 9" x 5" x 3"

#### QUICK BREADS

Entries to be placed on appropriate size white paper plate and placed in a clean, clear zipper lock style plastic bag, with entry tag affixed to outside of bag with sticky tape.

## SQUARES

Squares are to be 2" square and bars are to be 4" x 2". Place on an appropriate size white paper plate and seal in a clean, clear zipper lock style plastic bag. Attach entry tag to the outside of bag with sticky tape.

## PASTRIES

Pies must be entered in tin foil pie plates. Enclose in a clear plastic bag and seal.

HINT: Before use, put tin foil pans in a 450 to 500 degrees F. oven for about 5 minutes so BOTTOM crust bakes better. Tarts are to be placed on a small white paper plate and sealed in a zipper lock style plastic bag.

## CAKES

All cakes are to be 8" or 9" square or round unless otherwise indicated. They are to be presented on a solid base not more than 2" larger than the cake. Cakes can be covered by a clear plastic dome-type lid or placed in a clear plastic bag and sealed. Cupcakes are to be placed on a small white paper plate and sealed in a zipper lock style plastic bag.
